(Salary Range \$25-29.32 per hour, depending on experience and licensure).

Job Description

INFANT- EARLY CHILDHOOD MENTAL HEALTH THERAPIST Child Parent Psychotherapy Specific

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The Infant-Early Childhood Mental Health (IECMH) Therapist provides Child Parent Psychotherapy to low-income King County families with children ages birth to six who have experienced traumatic stress. This position is within the Community Based Intensive Services Department, in the Infant-Early Childhood Mental Health (IECMH) Program. This is a grant funded position. Reports to the IECMH Manager. (Salary Range \$52k- \$62k)

The IECMH Program at Center for Human Services has been providing dyadic, home-based therapy to families with very young children for over 10 years, serving North King County and South Snohomish County. The program enrolls children, as well as pregnant women or parents with very young children. The team partners with other service providers to ensure the right type and intensity of services are provided, based on each family's situation. The IECMH Program also serves as clinical treatment providers for children birth to eight enrolled in WISE Wraparound Services in King and Snohomish



Counties and provides some services on-site at local schools. The IECMH clinicians benefit from weekly reflective consultation, individual reflective supervision, and frequent training opportunities.

MAJOR RESPONSIBILITIES – Specific for this position

- Provide Child Parent Psychotherapy (CPP) to eligible families with young children, following the CPP treatment model and utilizing trauma informed and social justice informed interventions to facilitate recovery from trauma or other stressors, and support healthy parent-child relationships
- Conduct CPP Assessment, which includes initial eligibility intake in addition to a thorough assessment of child that includes developmental screening, symptom profile, and traumatic stress history.
- Conduct formal parent-child relationship assessments periodically throughout treatment
- Conduct parent interviews as part of the Foundational Phase of CPP, including gathering parent trauma history
- Work in collaboration with case manager to ensure families have access to resources in their community.
- Participate in program development and evaluation of the IEC Program and overall Community Based Intensive Services (CBIS) Department
- Actively promote CHS programs to families and individuals; develop and maintain relationships with community contacts, referral sources, and other professionals and agencies
- Maintain accurate and thorough clinical records as per agency, county and state requirements
- Provide input and report to leadership regarding the clinical needs of clients and improved ways of offering services and supervision.
- Sustain billable hours as determined by supervisor
- Collaborates closely with the IECMH team
- Participate in regular reflective supervision, case consultation, and all-staff meetings
- Maintain or work towards Washington State IMH/IEC Endorsement.
- Meet with clients in homes and the community as well as the office
- Maintain a client caseload and appropriate clinical records
- Conduct collaborative documentation with clients during therapy sessions
- Maintain a professional and courteous attitude to all clients, partners and community members

MAJOR RESPONSIBILITIES – Agency in general

- Provide all services utilizing a strengths-based, family-focused, client-centered, trauma-informed, culturally competent approach that is integrated with other services
- Participate in creating and maintaining a workplace that values diversity and treats everyone with dignity and respect without regard to race, color, age, religion, creed, gender, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, national origin, marital status, the presence of any sensory, mental, or physical disability
- Utilize teamwork and open communication
- Have prompt and consistent attendance during scheduled working hours
